

# What's new in College Admissions

- Common Application has increased applications for most colleges. It's used by over 1,000 colleges. Over 400 schools have no application fee. Fee waivers on Common Application for students who qualify.
- Test Optional for out of state schools. Generally, if your test score is within range of the school averages listed on the website you should submit the score. The ideal student to go test score optional is one who has a strong transcript with rigorous courses and good grades. Florida schools are required by the legislature to require test scores. Many colleges outside of Florida require test scores for scholarships.
- There is a lot of speculation about the recent decision of the Supreme Court to not allow schools to admit students using affirmative action. Schools still value diversity.
- Return on your investment- will the degree be worth the cost you've paid for college
- The Florida universities have been named #1 in the country by US News for the 6<sup>th</sup> year in a row. This is due, in part, to the low cost of earning a degree. Florida is the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest university system in the country with 430,000 students.

# College List

- Don't rule out dream schools or private colleges
- Reciprocity Agreements with Florida schools
- Visiting schools is called "the golden ticket"
- Ask them to give you in state tuition.
- Check websites to see what is important to schools and do a "deeper dive" to see what the different majors look like
- There should be about 6 schools on your list. Two "reach schools", two realistic schools and two "safety schools"



# Types of Decisions

- Early Admissions: preferred by most schools. Deadline is October 15 (FSU) or November 1.
- Early Decision: a binding agreement, used if you KNOW the school is your #1 choice. This can increase your chances of admission. Check statistics to find out if it will be an advantage.
- Rolling Admissions: used by non-competitive schools or schools who want to fill up spots after EA and ED.
- Deferred: Colleges usually are watching for more information to see if you will qualify. Can be test scores or, more often, senior year first semester grades
- Denied: Not a good fit for the school. Appealing decision is usually only successful
  if there is a change in student status.

# Self Reported Student Academic Record (SSAR)

- 1. Go to ssar.selfreportedtranscript.com
- 2. Using the transcript as a guide, fill in the coursework
- 3. Use the student number at the end and enter it on the Common App
- 4. Coursework for the senior year needs to be reported. Students need to report any dropped classes to the colleges or Common Application at the end of first semester.
- At some point the students will need to get a transcript from any postsecondary institutions they have attended. Transcripts will be mailed to the college they will attend.
- May 1 is the deadline to choose the college the student will attend. Students should put down a dorm deposit as soon as possible to secure the best room.

# SCHOLARSHIPS AND GRANTS

# Types of Scholarships

Government: Federal and State

Federal- must fill out Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Pell Grant is

one of the main grants given by the Federal government. The application

opens December 1. New and easier to fill out. Uses taxes from 2 years ago. 42 ques.

Work Study is another type of aid.

State- Florida Bright Futures, Jose Marti, various others. Must fill out floridafinacialaid.org. Application opens October 1.

- Institutional Financial Aid- Colleges vary on deadlines and policies. Early is better.
- Private Scholarships- Use search engines, such as Fastweb.com, to find.

# Florida Scholarships

## Florida Bright Futures Requirements

- Florida Academic Scholar
- 3.5 GPA in core subjects only
- 1340 on SAT
- 29 on ACT
- 100 hours of community service or work 75 hours of community service or work experience
- Must fill out application on floridafinancial aid.org. Application opens October 1

- Florida Medallion Scholar
- 3.0 GPA in core subjects only
- 1210 on the SAT
- 25 on the ACT
- experience
- Must fill out the application on floridafinancialaid.org. Application opens October 1

# Scholarship Tips

- Apply early- most financial aid is given in February.
- Work with the financial aid office at the university
- Some schools require the CSS- College Search Service Profile. Check your college website. This application is through College Board. Application fee is required. This is a longer more detailed application.
- Some schools automatically consider you for merit aid, based on SAT/ACT or grades.
- Do your homework on the website.
- Raise.me and College Board opportunity scholarships are easy to get
- Scholarships stack and can bring in a significant amount of money
- Carefully compare award letters after being admitted. Loans are usually listed.
